Who is a CASA volunteer?

CASA volunteers care about children – their safety, well-being and future. They are ordinary citizens who help children in an extraordinary way.

What does having a CASA volunteer mean to a child?

Imagine what it would be like to be taken out of your home... to lose your parents... not because of something you did, but because your parents can't – or won't – take care of you. Now, into your life come dozens of strangers: police, doctors, foster parents, social workers, judges, lawyers, and more.

Having a CASA volunteer means having by your side a trained and committed adult who has been appointed by a Juvenile Court Judge to watch over you, and advocate for your best interests. That volunteer will investigate your case to make sure you don't get lost in the overburdened legal and social service system, or languish in an inappropriate group or foster home. They will be there for you, making sure all your needs are being met, until you're in a safe and permanent home and your case is closed.

Currently, there are approximately 340 children in Vermilion County who have been placed into the foster care system due to allegations of abuse or neglect by their parents. These kids need CASAs. CASAs choose just one child or sibling group to look after, and set their own hours (on average 8 hours per month). CASAs collaborate with the child's social worker, teachers, foster parents, Guardian ad litem – all individuals involved in the case, and report their recommendations to the Court to ensure their child will become part of a family, rather than remain part of a "system."
